EDITORIAL

This third volume of the *European Yearbook of the History of Psychology. Sources, Theories, and Models* (EYHP) maintains the overall structure of the two previous ones. Along with *Original essays*, it encompasses the sections: *Documents and archival material*; *Discussions* (a space where authors can compare views and discuss specific topics); *Interviews*; *Book reviews and reading recommendations*. Only the *Short papers* section is missing in this volume; this lack is compensated by the fact that the ‘Discussions’ section contains a large number of short articles on the history of Hungarian psychology in the 20th century.

In this volume, the Original essay devoted to the Spanish psychologist Miquel Siguan (1918–2010) is strictly connected to the section ‘Interviews’, which presents for the first time the transcript of a talk delivered by Siguan as invited keynote speaker at the 2002 Conference of the European Society for the History of the Human Sciences in Barcelona. In this talk, Siguan reflected on his life and career at the age of 84. After the interviews with Mario Zanforlin (Vol. 1) and Wolfgang Schönplflug (Vol. 2), this talk represents the continuation of a project that we hope will illustrate the history of European psychology from the twentieth to the twenty-first century.

The obituary is dedicated to Lothar Sprung (1934–2017), who passed on suddenly in this year. With him history of psychology (and not only) has lost an assiduous researcher and reliable friend.

Once again, my thanks go to all those who have actively supported EYHP’s scientific and publishing project, and in par-

ticular I wish to thank all my colleagues, scholars of the history of psychology, who were willing to join the Editorial Board, along with the Editorial staff. And I wish to thank the publishing house Brepols that with great cultural sensitivity allowed this project to see the light.
